


In addition, the seminar sessions will emphasize the techniques these administrators have actually used and compare them with ideal models of administration.

This seminar offers chairs the opportunity to study the art of departmental administration through close interaction with colleagues from other institutions and disciplines.

The presentations given by the experienced department chairs will center on actual techniques used as well as ideal models of administration.

Onslaught of Email Viruses Creating Havoc for CCAS Listsery and Email

As all of us are highly aware, email viruses have been circulating throughout the Internet. The latest ones seem to be particularly nasty. Recently, the CCAS office received two messages of the highest priority from our IT department to update our antivirus software immediately – two days in a row!

Unfortunately, most institutions have had more than ample experience dealing with these viruses. In response, some have closed down their email servers temporarily to initiate repairs and install new security strategies. Others have had to severely restrict both incoming and outgoing email until the damage could be found and fixed.

This had led to some serious changes in the way many IT departments handle email in order to prevent future infections. For example, the mail server may have had additional security software installed, or perhaps the IT department decided to change everything – including the hardware (computer) as well as software.

What all of this means is that if you have had problems recently accessing the CCAS listserv or sending CCAS email, it may be because of security changes at your location. This is especially true if your email address has changed. As IT departments tighten security to keep viruses out, it can also have the unexpected side-effect of blocking more email addresses... even those messages you *want* to receive.

So, if you post to the listserv and get an error, or send email to the CCAS office and it "bounces" (returns to you saying your email can't be delivered), first check to see if your email address has changed. If so, please notify us so we can update your information.

Otherwise, just keep trying. Your messages will usually get through – eventually!O

author of such books and essays as *There's No Such Thing as Free Speech: And It's a Good Thing, Too; The Trouble with Principle*; and "Reverse Racism, or How the Pot Got to Call the Kettle Black."

Fish has even gone toe-to-toe with Fox's "No Spin Zone" grill-master Bill O'Reilly over whether the use of the word "evil" is productively descriptive of terrorism and Osama Bin Laden. Fish says no.

Fish is also a literary and legal theorist. As an American literary theorist, he is known for his writings about the role of the reader in literature. After receiving his Ph.D. in English literature from Yale (1962), Fish has taught at University of California Berkeley (1962–74) and Johns Hopkins University (1974–85).

In 1986 he became both a professor of law and the chair of the English Department at Duke University,

where he has attracted a stellar group of theorists. His treatise Surprised by Sin: The Reader in Paradise Lost and the books Self-Consuming Artifacts: The Experience of Seventeenth-Century Literature (1972) and Is There a Text in This Class?: The Authority of Interpretive Communities (1980) are among his most significant contributions to the field.

He was Arts and Sciences Professor of English and Professor of Law at Duke from 1986-1998. From 1993 through 1998, he also served as Executive Director of Duke University Press.

From 2000 to 2002 he was a Distinguished Visiting Professor at the John Marshall Law School in Chicago.

Currently, Fish is dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at the University of Illinois, Chicago. •

Prior to Dr. Palmer Noone's appointment as President in July 2000, she served for more than six years as the Provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs. In this position, Dr. Palmer Noone was responsible for the managing and development of nine bachelor's, master's and doctoral level degree programs, seven schools, faculty governance, learning resources, institutional research, academic press, and state, federal and accreditation compliance. Before being promoted as the University's chief academic officer, Dr. Palmer Noone served as the Director of Academic Affairs at the Phoenix Campus for three years.

Since 1999, Dr. Palmer Noone has served as a guest faculty lecturer at the Harvard University Graduate School of Education's Institute for Education Management and for the Management of Lifelong Education program. At the University of Phoenix, Dr. Palmer Noone has served as faculty at the Phoenix campus, having taught

business, business law, ethics and communications courses, and served as the area chair for the Senior Faculty. Dr. Palmer Noone has also taught at Grand Canyon University and Chandler-Gilbert Community College, both in Arizona.

Dr. Palmer Noone's legal experience includes ten years service as an attorney-at-law in general civil practice in Iowa and Arizona. Additionally she has served as a Judge Pro Tem for the City of Chandler, Arizona. Dr. Palmer Noone continues as an active member of the American Bar Association, the State Bar Association of Arizona, and the Maricopa County Bar Association.

Among her many activities, Dr. Palmer Noone serves as Vice-Chair of the U.S. Department of Education's National Advisory Committee on Institutional Quality and Integrity, as a Director of the American Council on Education, as a Director of the ACE Committee on Leadership and Institutional Effectiveness, and as a member of the Board of Trustees of the

University of Dubuque. Additionally, Dr. Palmer Noone serves on the Arizona Board for Private Postsecondary Education and the Arizona Task Force on the Western Governor's University. Dr. Palmer Noone serves on the editorial board of Future magazine and has served as a textbook reviewer for West Publishing. Dr. Palmer Noone is a member of the Board of Directors of Banner Health Foundation of Arizona, and the East Valley Child Crisis Center in Phoenix.

Dr. Palmer Noone is frequently requested as a keynote speaker and has addressed audiences across the country regarding for-profit higher education, non-traditional education and modes of delivery, and the use of new technology in education.

Dr. Palmer Noone received her Ph.D. in Higher Education Administration from The Union Institute. She received her Juris Doctor degree and Master of Business Administration degree from the University of Iowa, and her Bachelor of Business Administration degree from the University of Dubuque.

Montclair State University is a comprehensive public university offering a rich array of programs to approximately 15,500 undergraduate students and post-baccalaureate students. Founded in 1908, the University is organized into three colleges and three schools: College of Education & Human Services, College of Humanities & Social Sciences, College of Science & Mathematics, School of the Arts, School of Business, and the Graduate School. The Dean will be responsible for the administrative and fiscal management of the College, overseeing a budget of approximately \$16 million. The Dean will give special attention to the development of academic programs and the recruitment and development of faculty. She/he will be responsible for effectively representing the College to the campus, alumni and external communities, and provide leadership in the pursuit of the external resources required to augment State appropriations. The dean will be a key member of the University's senior leadership and will be imaginative in finding ways to advance the goals and objectives of both the College and the University and fostering collaborations across the campus.

Qualifications: A candidate should possess an earned doctorate and a record of distinguished academic achievement appropriate for appointment at the rank of full professor in a department of the College. In addition, she/he should possess:
