
Humanities Indicators (http://www.humanitiesindicators.org): A general source of information on various aspects of the humanities (in K-12, higher education, the workforce, funding and research, and the wider public).

Advanced Placement Program Data

(http://research.collegeboard.org/programs/ap/data/participation/ap-2014): The AP program provides highly detailed reports and trend data on the demographic characteristics of the students taking AP tests, and the subjects in which they are taking them.

WebCaspar (http://webcaspar.nsf.gov/): An essential clearinghouse for specific data about degrees conferred at all levels, which allows researchers to parse degree recipients into specific demographic categories and institutions. Survey of Earned Doctorates (http://www.nsf.gov/statistics/sed/2012/): This survey provides a detailed snapshot of new Ph.D. recipients at the time of their degree. In addition to gross numbers, it also provides demographic details about who is receiving the degree, how long they spent working toward it, and their immediate employment plans and prospects.
